Webinar topic: Residential School System

February 27: The History of the Residential School System

This session will cover how the residential school system came to be, the residential school experience, and the legal fall-out, including the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement, the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, and the establishment of the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation. We'll conclude by looking at the NCTR Archives and how to access its records.

March 4: The Legacy of the Residential School System

This session will cover the ongoing impacts of the residential school system, including intergenerational trauma, the Sixties Scoop, Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, forced sterilizations of Indigenous women, the justice system, and other ongoing social issues such as housing, food & water security, etc. We will then turn to resilience and reconciliation, and conclude by looking at measures of allyship that one can take.

Laura Myers is a retired teacher with over 30 years of experience, teaching primarily high school mathematics. After watching "Before the Flood" on Earth Day in 2017, she decided it was time to explicitly incorporate climate change into her math classes. In 2019, Laura was trained as a Climate Reality Leader through the Climate Reality Project and in 2020, she started teaching Environmental Science 120. In 2022, she was awarded the 2022 Gaia Champion Teacher Award for excellence in climate action and youth empowerment. In June of 2022, she decided to retire from classroom teaching and made climate change education her primary focus when she joined Learning for a Sustainable Future as an environmental educational consultant.
